WEEK ONE | BEGIN BY LOOKING WITHIN

Expressive writing |

- Choose which questions you'll answer. You don't have to answer all of them; just the ones that resonate.
- Choose when you'll write. Write at a time when you won't be interrupted.
- Write expressively for 20-minutes. Do so non-stop. Do not go over your writings. Do not edit or censor yourself.
- Review what you wrote, but in three days.

Why I

The whole point to this expressive writing exercise is to help you uncover the blocks you may have in hearing another person's pain.

Parents- Use the journal in this box to answer these writing prompts.

How did your parents talk about skin color? How did their beliefs and views shape you? How do you feel about the words your family use to refer to people of color today, now that you're older? Write a prayer and ask "God what do you want to say to me through this study"

Teens- How is the topic of race discussed by your peers? How do those conversations or things you hear make you feel? What do you think God feels on this topic?


CHALLENGE |

Terms |

Race | Categories into which society places individuals on the basis of physical characteristics such as skin color, hair type, facial form and eye shape.

Racial bias | A preference for or against an individual or group that affects one's beliefts or judgements about them. Explicit bias is intentional and implicit bias is unconscious attitudes, stereotyping, and actions toward members of a specific group because of their membership in that group.

How would you define racism? Have you ever felt as though you were treated differently because of your skin color or any other attribute that makes you different than others?



Terms |

Ally A person who speaks out or takes action to support someone who is targeted by bias

Marginalization | Treatment of a person, group, or idea as inferior or unimportant as compared to those who hold more power in society

Cultural appropriation | Using elements of a marginalized culture, including clothing, images, or ideas, in ways that disrespect the culture. One example often used to illustrate cultural appropriation is history, experience and traditions.

WEEK THREE

Emotion | Expressive Writing prompts

Parent- As a child, how was your anger or sadness handled by your parents, caregivers, older siblings? Were you encouraged to express it, or were you shamed, ridiculed, or humiliated in showing those emotions? How did you witness other family members handling negative emotions? Was it encouraged or was it shut down? By whom? How did that person react? What were the words they used? Do you feel comfortable expressing anger, sadness, or pain in your family today? Why or why not?

Teen- How are hard emotions handled in your family? What are some things that your parents do well to help you navigate this and what are some things that they could do better?

After writing in your individual journals, consider sharing what you've written.



Terms |

Microaggressions | Put-downs and insults—including unintentional comments or even compliments—that people of color and other marginalized people experience on a daily basis. They are less noticeable than overt aggression like bullying, but are also harmful.

White privilege | The advantages and benefits that white people experience solely as a result of their skin color—benefits that are not experienced by people of color


How can you relate to each character? How do we live out this story in our own life?



Terms |

One-drop rule | Dating back to 1662 in Virginia, this rule stated that anyone with any fraction ("drop") of African "blood" would be considered Black. People with no known African ancestry were called White.

Person of color (POC) | Refers to any person who is non-White. Sometimes also referred to as Black, Indigenous, or People of Color (BIPOC)

Power | The ability to influence others and impose one's own convictions. All power is relational, and different relationships either reinforce or disrupt one another.

Prejudice | A preset opinion about a people group based on culture, race, religion, or socioeconomic status because of false narratives learned through family, the media, conversation, or observation.

Racism vs. prejudice | This can be confusing. Prejudice refers to a judgment or belief about a person or group of people that is not based in facts or knowledge. Racism is prejudice against people because of their race.
